Theophylline for Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease

Low-dose theophylline may enhance the anti-inflammatory activity of inhaled corticosteroids. Devereux and colleagues randomized 1567 patients with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease and found that the addition of low-dose theophylline to inhaled corticosteroids did not reduce the number of acute exacerbations. In an Editorial, Criner and Celli speculate whether an inhaled formulation of theophylline or a pharmacological analogue with a better safety profile could be developed.

Weight Regain After Bariatric Surgery

Bariatric surgery is the most effective treatment for severe obesity, but many patients regain some of the weight lost after surgery. King and colleagues followed 2458 adults who underwent Roux-en-Y gastric bypass and found that the percentage of maximum weight lost was more strongly associated with clinical outcomes than other measures of weight regain. In an Editorial, Ghaferi and Varban suggest that weight regain associated with the return of comorbid disease may indicate the need for medical or behavioral interventions.

Coronary artery disease and cerebrovascular disease are leading causes of morbidity and mortality for patients with type 2 diabetes. Fisher and colleagues conducted a retrospective cohort study of severely obese patients with diabetes and found that bariatric surgery was associated with a lower risk of macrovascular outcomes than usual care. In an Editorial, Sheka and colleagues suggest that if bariatric surgery is more effective than aggressive medical therapy for patients

with obesity and type 2 diabetes, insurance coverage for weight loss operations should be expanded.
