Fecal Microbiota Transplantation via Oral Capsule



Fecal microbiota transplantation (FMT) is the most effective therapy for recurrent Clostridium difficile infection. In a randomized trial by Kao and colleagues of 116 adult patients with recurrent Clostridium difficile infection, FMT via oral capsule was not inferior to FMT by colonoscopy for preventing recurrent infection. In an Editorial, Rao and colleagues discuss which components of donor stool are most likely to be beneficial.

Optimal Wait Time for Hip Fracture Surgery





Guidelines from the United States and Canada recommend surgery within 48 hours after hip fracture to prevent complications and avoid prolonged hospitalization. Pincus and colleagues conducted a population-based, retrospective cohort study of 42230 adults undergoing hip fracture surgery at 72 hospitals and found that increased wait time was associated with a

greater risk of 30-day mortality. In an Editorial, Vrahas and Sax note that at 24 hours after injury the risk of complications began to increase, suggesting that surgical repair should be performed as soon as it is feasible.

Selective Androgen Receptor Modulators Sold on the Internet

Selective androgen receptor modulators (SARMs), which can be purchased as "dietary supplements" from internet sites without a prescription, are used to build muscle and modify body contours. Van Wagoner and colleagues analyzed 44 products marketed as SARMs on the internet and found that most were mislabeled and many contained untested compounds. In an Editorial, Auchus and Brower suggest that the widespread use of androgenic substances is an emerging epidemic analogous to the opioid crisis.
